Visit to Cambodia Family Support 31 Oct – 3 Nov 2018

Helen and I spent 4 days with Dr Samnang visiting Cambodia Family Support (CFS) operations in Kamrieng and Rattanak Mondul districts of Battambang Province, as well as the Salakarau district of Pailin Province.

For those rusty on the geography of this area of North-West Cambodia the map below will refresh:



CFS has been active for 10 years now. CFS first started working in 2008 in Rattanak Mondul district and then then spread to Kamrieng (the 2 western-most districts of Battambang Province (total 14 districts). At the beginning of 2017, with generous funding of a US private foundation and the support of our CFS-USA board, operations commenced in Pailin Province. Activities in Pailin include the standard village-based activities of poverty alleviation, water and sanitation, housing and income generation. CFS also established the Pailin Family Center (PFC) in Pailin City, which serves as a 'crisis center' for the referral of family emergencies, including victims of domestic violence, sexual abuse, medical emergencies, deserted children etc. Currently CFS is only working in Salakrau, the nearest of Pailin's 2 districts.

CFS staffing now totals 14 persons (including the program director Dr Samnang). Field activities follow a well-tried approach:

- initial evaluation of a village to assess need for assistance
- formation of a communal representational body, the 'Village Self-Help Group' (SHG)
- collaborative approach by CFS, community leaders and the SHG to address needs.

Interventions focus on:

- identifying the most vulnerable (physically disabled/mine injured individuals, widows with children, child-only families etc.)
- basic housing construction/repair

- improving access to water
- improving sanitation & hygiene
- income generation initiatives, e.g. market garden, raising cow, pig, chicken, duck or fish, road-side stall
- school attendance for children -- those not attending are investigated to ensure that they are able to attend (this may include providing school uniforms, transport, in some situations building a small school/literacy centre).

We met with the Pailin deputy governor and the Provincial head of the Ministry of Women's Affairs (MOWA). We discussed the proposed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that was suggested by the Minister of Women's Affairs whom we met during our visit to Phnom Penh in November 2017 (below).




Dr Samnang will proceed with this initiative, facilitated by his excellent relationship with the Government authorities in Pailin and Battambang.

Dr Samnang has collected a mass of demographic data on the populations in CFS serves. This provides an excellent tool to measure program impact. A tiny slice of this data:

It is sobering to reflect on the fact that almost 2.2% of the adult population in these three locations are disabled as a result of land-mine injuries. This group is a particular target for CFS.


